<> Make sure you make an order for the 2008 Call Book at the next General Meeting.

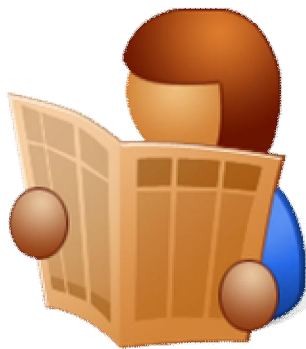
<> We are going to have to start preparing for the Labour Day weekend pretty soon, so let's hear some great holiday locations at the next General Meeting.

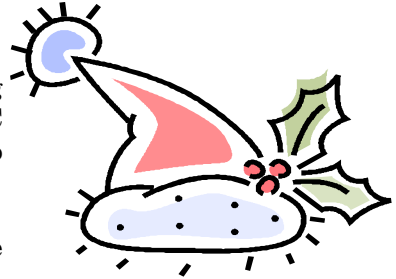

(P.S. Ed, it's only toooo dollars but sanctioned by Santa.)

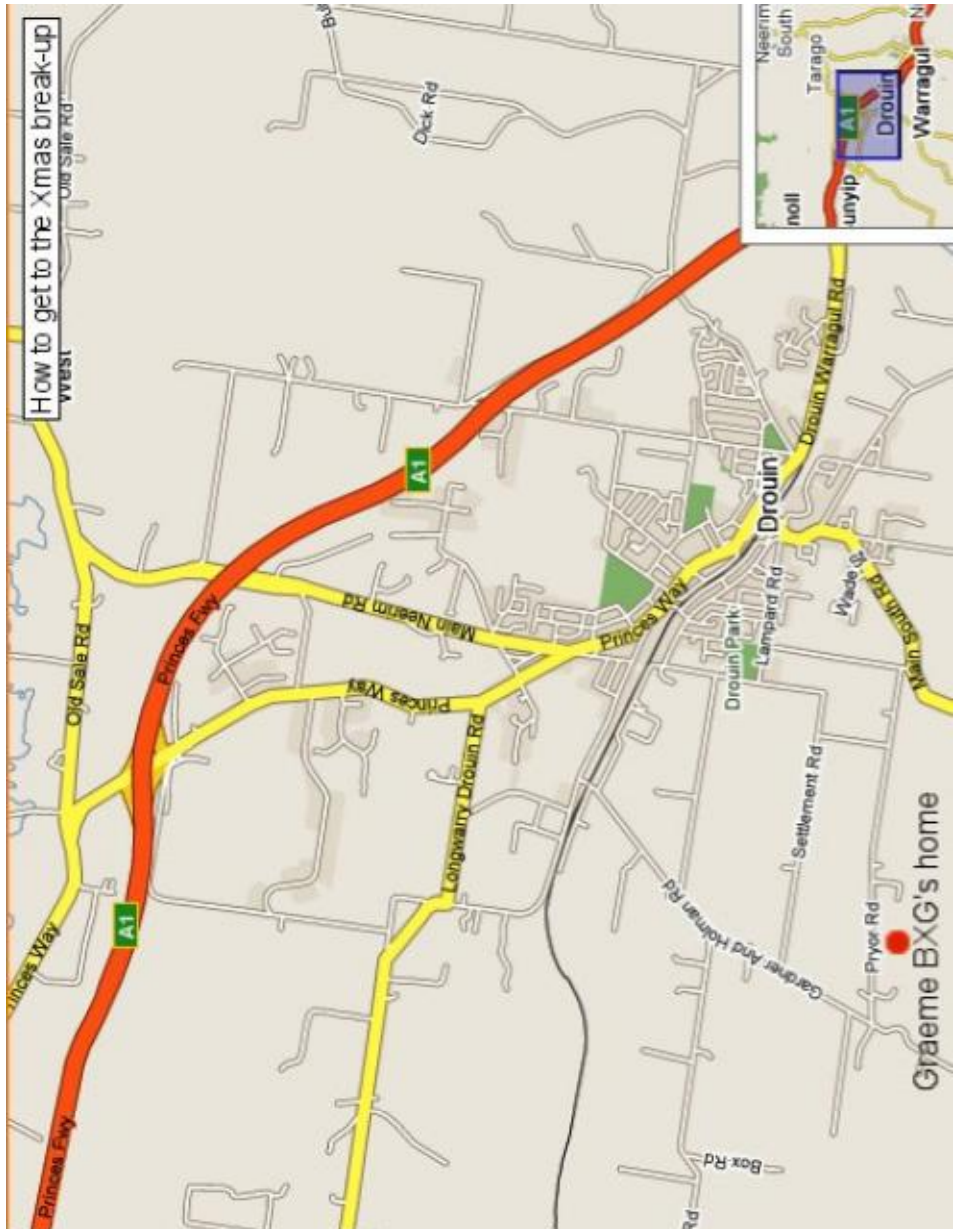
Spring VHF / UHF Field Day
